Bellandur Lake froths, foam looks more toxic than before

Conditions may worsen with onset of monsoon, fear residents

BENGALURU. DHNS: The Bellandur Lake began frothing again after a heavy downpour on Thursday night, spewing thick foam around its peripheral areas and spreading fear of further deterioration during the forthcoming monsoon.

Residents said the froth this time was a thick brew of synthetic nylon texture filled with a discernible black strand. "It wasn't the normal kind of foam," a resident told DH, adding that it was not evaporating unlike in the past.

Resident Shalini Batra said the lake was spewing foam out of the fence on the Bellandur side. No foaming was seen on the Varthur side, where the Bangalore Development Authority had drained the lake to

fix the sluice gates.

Things would only get worse with the intensifying rainfall during the monsoon, said Shonali Sing, a local resident and member of the Citizen Watch Group. "It won't be long before history starts repeating itself," she said, referring to the situation in the past when cars parked on the roadside were coated with the foam sprayed by the lake.

Even the sprinklers installed by the Palike, as pointed out by some residents, are of no use as they are soaked in the toxic foam and malfunctioned.

Dismayed by the lack of improvement in the lake's condition despite efforts by the authority, residents urged the government to speed up the process of installing the sewage treatment plants

Brand-new Church Street rotting with leaking drainage, garbage

BENGALURU, DHNS: Just two months after Chief Minister Siddaramaiah unveiled the 750-metre Church Street. sewage began flooding the brand-new cobblestone top due to blocked drainage chambers.

Siddaramaiah hastened the inauguration of the still unfinished street — opening it on March 1 — to beat the poll code. With cobblestones still to be laid on a few sections of the footpath, the drainage overflow has turned the thoroughfare into a terrible

One of the major roads in the Central Business District, Church Street was renovated under the TenderSURE project at a cost of Rs 14 crore. "A lot of money was spent to upgrade Church Street. Two months after its opening, the work is still incomplete. lamented M Muralidhara Hegde, who owns an office here. "The water well in our building, used by a restaurant, has been contaminated since the renovation work. It was good prior to the renovation, path and the optical fibre cable as described by the BBMP,



but now the BBMP has alloweddrainage water to mix with the source," he further said.

The Church Street renovation work began on February 22, 2017, and the Palike missed several deadlines before it was opened on March 1. Work is still going on at a snail's pace between Empire Hotel and St Marks Road.

"The stretch is in a dangerous condition," said Mohan, a shopkeeper. "People find it difficult to walk in the night due to the open chambers.

The city's only international-standard road laid with Kasuti-pattern cobblestones,

is littered and the garbage dumps here brim with solid waste. "Everything from beer bottles to cigarette packets and hotel wastes is dumped on the roadside. The garbage dumps are overflowing. Notice to BSY, others in land case

BENGALURU, DHNS: The high court on Friday issued emergent notices to BJP leaders B S Yeddyurappa, Jagadish Shettar, R Ashoka and others, and also issued notice to the state government, BDA and the Anti-Corruption Bureau in a petition concerning illegal denotification of land.

The court was hearing a petition filed by Wing Commander G B Athri, seeking directions to the ACB to re-investigate a complaint alleging illegal denotification of land by the then chief minister Yeddyurappa, acquired by BDA to benefit Ashoka.

The petition states that the denotification was done illegally despite officials advising against it. The BDA had acquired 18 guntas of land (survey number 10/1) at Lottegollahalli for Rajmahal Vilas II Phase through a notification on April 23, 1988.

BENGALURU, DHNS: The technical committee constituted by the NGT to look into proposals to rejuvenate Bellandur and Varthur lakes, which met for the first time on Friday, failed to deliberate anything as officials called off the meeting citing the model code of conduct.

A few experts, who attended the meeting, expressed anger over the cancellation.

"The meeting was called just to announce that no decision can be taken until the model code of conduct was in place. The next date of the meeting was also not decided. If this was the case, there was no need to call the meeting," said one of the committee members.

Ravindra Babu, Bangalore Development Authority engineer; Nagaraj, Bruhat Bengaluru Mahanagara Palike engineer; A N Yellappa Reddy, noted environmentalist; IISc Prof T V Ramachandra, Raja from Scalene Energy Water

Madhusudhan from Karna taka State Pollution Control Board attended the meeting.

The members said that no proposals could be discussed in the meeting.

"The meeting started with the discussion on ways to revive the Varthur Lake. Some plans were tabled. The members of Art of Living Foundation suggested sprinkling microbes, natural and chemical substances to curtail pollution and frothing in the Varthur Lake. "We were informed about the location in the last minute and could not make it on time," Shonali Singh, member of Citizens Watch Group said. Interestingly, frothing at the Bellandur Lake was listed as one of the agendas of the meeting. But the officials brushed it aside stating: "There is nothing new about it as it has been happening for the past two years.

2nd highest rainfall for the year in city

According to the India Meteorological Department (IMD), up to 8.30 am on Friday, the city received 15.3 mm rainfall, HAL airport 39.4 mm and Kempegowda Interna-tional Airport (KIA) received 36 mm of rain.

The highest recorded so far was 16.8 mm on April 21. From March 1, the city so far has received 123 mm of rain, HAL airport 133 mm and the KIA 157 mm of rain.

The heavy downpour led to tree fall in many places. The BBMP received complaints regarding this from across the city, including Rajarajeshwari Nagar, Mahalakshmi Layout, Old Airport Road, Sanjay Nagar, SVG Road, Moodalpalya, Rajajinagar, AM Layout, Kumara Park and surrounding

However, it did not get any vaterlogging complaints.

The heavy downpour and prolonged thundershowers have led to a drop in temperatures. The city recorded a maximum of 33.7 degrees Celsius
