Ahaetulla nasutus feeding on Uropeltis ellioti

It was 20 August 2004 at 12 noon; I was on a field trip to Sharavathi River basin at Muppane nature camp (74°47'71" E; 14°06'92" N; 571 m amsl) saw a Vine snake (Ahaetulla nasutus) dangling from a tree having a shield-tail snake in its mouth. Shield tail was more than 50% inside the vine snake, at the time when I saw it. It took around 10 more minutes to swallow the remaining portion. I took quite a few pictures and later when I showed them to Mr. M.S. Chaitra of Wildlife Institute of India and Mr. Aneesh Andharia of Wildlife Conservation Society, they confirmed the Shield tail to be Uropeltis ellioti. Uropeltis ellioti (Elliot's Shield tail) is an endemic snake of the Western Ghats with lower risk near threatened IUCN status. Ahaetulla nasutus (Common vine snake) a non-endemic with lower risk near threatened category. This may be the first report of Vine snake feeding on shield tail.
