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How green was my Bangalore city once

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BANGALORE: Last month, Pushparekha, a bioscience researcher settled in the US, travelled from Mekhri Circle to GKVK, on a visit. Prof T N Prakash Kammardi of University of Agricultural Sciences (UAS) recalls that she greeted him teary-eyed. "It was a pleasure once to travel on this stretch, today there are only a handful of trees here," Prakash quoted his former student as saying.

Has the green paradise that Bangalore was been lost forever? The city has seen trees vanishing faster than it's assumed. In the last 4-5 years, official estimates show that over 50,000 trees have been axed for road widening alone. It has just one tree for seven of its citizens, with the ratio even lower in some areas.

"Bangalore's already facing the result of reckless tree felling as authorities take shortcuts to kill the city's flora. No one thinks of long-term side-effects," says Kapil Sharma, founder of Saytrees, a group of techies working for the cause of trees in Bangalore.

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So, what is it that Bangalore needs to change? There are many voices and many answers. Some suggest afforestation in areas outside the core city to compensate for the depleting green cover within. But experts who have studied the issue for long say growth has to be inclusive, and citizens must help Bangalore protect its existing greenery and regain some of what's lost.

Prakash, who has just retired from UAS, offers three solutions to reclaim Bangalore's green glory. One, private forestry, in homes large enough to house a tree, or two. "But a city can rarely accommodate that, so we should look at social forestry, in common avenues. This doesn't mean we only suggest gardens or parks. We'll have to look beyond them," he says.

For a city blessed with tanks and lakes, the third, he says, is to save our water bodies and use tank bunds to feed our trees. But citizen engagement, he says, is most necessary. "Wherever there is public land, the government should take initiative. In other places, citizens must get incentives to plant and take care of trees. There are a lot of groups doing it and the agencies must take it forward and make more citizens participate," he feels.

Dr S G Neginhal, retired chief conservator of forest, says: "One cannot chop a tree here and plant a sapling elsewhere to compensate. If Jayanagar loses a tree, what's the use of planting two in Byappanahalli? Planting saplings in Byappanahalli is good but it doesn't restore Jayanagar's lost greenery. The problem is not with the soil or the family of trees here, it is with the willingness." Bangalore, he says, is blessed with great soil that can bear almost any tree. "I'd say champak, neem and the Pride of India are good. In case of exotic trees, the gulmohar and the rain trees are great," he adds

Sensitize planners

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Poor urban planning and proliferation of road networks have taken a heavy toll on the green cover. Projects like road construction should be well planned and designed to ensure minimum felling of trees. Alternative roads, advance or pre-planting of native trees prior to road construction and appropriate designing to save precious tree species are ways to minimize damage to the green cover and environment. More importantly, the planners and civil engineers need to be sensitized about issues concerning the environment
